Commentary			

Questions, Luke 18:18-19

The rich young ruler asked Jesus an important question. Then, Jesus answered his question with a question of His own. That raises the question, 'How many questions was Jesus asked?'. How many questions did Jesus ask of others? How many questions did the disciples ask? How many questions did His opponents ask? Did Jesus answer every question He was asked?

The answer to those questions is: I have no idea. Different commentators come up with widely different answers. The number of questions put to Jesus may be as small as 135, or as large as 307, or any number in between. Likewise, reports of the number of questions He answered differs widely.

With no definite number of questions or answers, I won't guess, I'll just stick to this text.

Good, Luke 18:18-19

Today's false assumption is 'we are all good', and we must 'learn to see the good in everyone'. When asked, 'can I help you?' we answer, 'No thanks. I'm good'.

"Why do you call Me good?" Jesus replied. "No one is good except God alone. v19
The word 'good' occurs some 372 times in the Old Testament. It is almost always used as an adjective. Such as, good land, or good fruit. Throughout all of history, up until the interview with this rich young ruler, no one, except God Himself, had been given the personal attribution of 'good'.

Everything that God does is 'good' and is demonstrated in Creation.

I was good. Genesis 1:1, 1:10, 1:12, 1:18, 1:21, 1:25, 1:31

The Promised Land was 'good'

You are about to cross over and take possession of that good land. Deuteronomy 4:22

We are expected to act in 'good' ways

The first hint of 'good' as a personal attribute:

The next statement of 'good' as a personal attribute is in the Psalms:

A camel going through the eye of a needle, Luke 18:25

If you're not laughing out loud when you read some passages in the Bible, you're missing the point. Of course, the message of the Bible is earnestly serious, but some of its stories and sayings are hilariously funny. Some of the loudest laughs are in the teachings of Jesus. He was not only a brilliant teacher, but also a pretty funny comedian. The Bible endorses humour, "There is a time to laugh" (Ecclesiastes 3:4), and "Then our mouths were filled with laughter, our tongues with shouts of joy." (Psalm 126:2). Some obvious examples of Jesus telling funny stories:

- "say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' while there is still a beam in your own eye" (Matthew 7:4)
- "a mustard seed that so that the birds of the air come and nest in its branches" (Matthew 13:31–32)

- "You strain out a gnat but swallow a camel" (Matthew 23:24) His first-century Jewish audience would have found the gnat-and-camel imagery really funny is because it's also a witty play-on-words in Aramaic: "You filter out a galma," but you gulp down a gamla!"
- o "Can a blind man lead a blind man? Will they not both fall into a pit?" Luke 6:39
- o "a camel to pass through the eye of a needle" (Mark 10:25, and Luke 18:25)

Jesus is God, and God laughs (Psalm 2:4) and God sings (Zephaniah 3:17).

Fake news

Once upon a time, some unknown preacher, with a theology of only literal interpretation, attempted to explain away the humour of Jesus' image of a camel going through the eye of a needle. So, he invented the story of a camel needing to be unloaded and to bend low to fit through a small gate which he labelled 'the eye of a needle gate'.

However, while there are small gates, beside which camels can be posed for photographs, there is absolutely no historical nor archaeological evidence that these small gates were ever called 'eye of the needle' gates. The imagery is picturesque, but fanciful.
