Both uses of the word "seen" is the base word  $\dot{o}p\dot{\alpha}\omega$  [Strongs 3708] meaning "perception, discernment, understanding", but merely a physical sighting.

If you had known Me, you would know My Father as well. From now on you do know Him and have seen Him. John 14:7

## Commentary

In approaching these verses, I asked myself the question: In 1 Peter 1:8-9, which verse is cause, and which is effect, or is there another alternative?

Could it be, Option A.

"...you love ...you believe ...you rejoice ...you are filled" v8 **because** "You are receiving..." v9 Which would make v9 the foundation, and v8 the consequence.

Or, could it be, Option B.

"...you love" ...etc v8 **and in this way** "You are receiving..." v9 Which would make v8 the foundation, and v9 the explanation.

Or, could it be, Option C.

v9 is a **continuation** of v8

Therefore, all of those "you..." statements in v8 and v9 are co-extensive, or sequential.

Or, could it be, Options D, E, or F.

My friend, David, directed me to this commentary:

Because the present participle κομιζόμενοι depends for its temporal understanding on the tense of the principal verb (in this case ἀγαπᾶτε and ἀγαλλιᾶσθε), it must be understood here as describing a present activity and is probably best understood in a causal sense: you are to love and rejoice because you are obtaining the goal of your faith. That it has a future orientation is nevertheless not to be denied; σωτηρία is here an eschatological term. The sense is that Christians now obtain by faith what they will only fully enter into at the end; the power of the new age is already at work and allows Christians in their present plight nevertheless to experience something of the eschatological joy awaiting them.

To which David concluded:

Taking the lead from Paul J. Achtemeier you could say that the certain of a person's destiny can certainly provide them with the meaning and purpose to life... It is clear that it is whole passage is focussed primarily on the perfecting of our faith, and that rather than 'cause' we should see verse 9 as the 'result'.

Glory is one of Peter's favourite words, with 20 occurrences in 1 & 2 Peter. The word 'glory' and its cognates, 'glorious', 'glorify', and 'glorified' reoccur in these verses

1 Peter 1:7, 1:8, 1:11, 1:21, 1:24, 2:12, 4:11, 4:11, 4:13, 4:14, 4:14, 4:16, 5:1, 5:4, 5:10.

2 Peter 1:3, 1:17, 1:17, 2:20, 3:18.

1 Peter 1:8 ends with the words, "...and [you] are filled with glory" What is this glory that fills us? "He called you to this through our Gospel, that you might share in the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ." 2 Thessalonians 2:14
